TREASURER'S REPORT

On April 30, our checking account balance was \$40,362 (includes grant balance of \$8,135). These numbers are about the same as last month.

A few highlights:

- Our budgeted Hawkins Leadership Award was bestowed to Cadet Scott Boster at our April meeting.
- Golf tournament deposits in April totaled \$3,360. Including all deposits to date (as of 5/2/24) our total golf income is up to \$18,125 with a net of \$17,429.

SPEAKER:

Major General (Ret) H. Laurie Newton, USA

He will speak on the leadership and citizenship responsibilities that our JROTC Scholarship Recipients will need to shoulder as they move forward to the next phase of their careers.

The General's military service began in September 1969. He was commissioned as an Armor Officer in March of 1973 after graduating from the Palmetto Military Academy and the South Carolina Army National Guard Junior Officer School. During his service, he has served as the Platoon Leader, Executive Officer, and Commander of Company A, 1-263 Armor Battalion as well as Operations Officer (S3), Executive Officer and Commander of 1st Battalion, 263rd Armor and as the Brigade Operations Officer (S3) of the 218th Enhanced Separate Brigade (ESB). Major General Newton later served as the Commander of the 218th ESB,

Newberry, South Carolina, Commander, 59th Troop Command, Columbia, South Carolina, as well as the Deputy Adjutant General, South Carolina Army National Guard. Major General Newton's final duty position prior to retirement was Commander, 263d AAMDC, a position that he assumed on 30 September 2007.

MG Newton's educational credentials include a BS in Science from Liberty University and an MA in Strategic Studies from the US Army War College. His numerous awards and decorations include the Distinguished Service Medal, the Legion of Merit (2 Awards), the South Carolina Meritorious Service Medal (2 Awards), and the South Carolina Exceptional Service Award.

Awards were given to the 12 cadets who will graduate and be commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant in the US Army



Some Notes on Colonel Robert T. Hawkins.....



Colonel Robert T. Hawkins, USA (Ret) 11 Apr 1942 - 6 Sep 2018. Retired Army Colonel and former Director of the Indiana Veterans Home, Robert T. (Bob) Hawkins, born on April 11, 1942, in Indianapolis, IN passed away on Sunday, September 2, 2018.

He was an active member of his community, volunteering in numerous organizations to promote the needs of veterans. He received the Volunteer of the Year Award for the city of Myrtle Beach as well as the Strom Thurmond Distinguished Public Service Award from the American Legion. During his twenty eight years of service in the Army, he received numerous

commendations including: The Bronze Star for service in Vietnam, The Legion of Merit (with 2 Oak Leaf clusters), Meritorious Service Medal (with 4 Oak Leaf clusters), Army Commendation Medal (with 4 Oak Leaf clusters), and Order of Military Medical Merit. Bob was a resolute member of our Chapter, serving as Vice President and Membership Chair. He touched the lives of many individuals and is missed.





Member in the SPOTLIGHT

Captain Hans Polzer, USAR



Hans Polzer was born in Staffelstein, Germany in 1947 and came to the US in 1953 when his parents emigrated from Germany to the US. His grandfather, Rudolf Polzer, had left Austria in 1938 when Hitler took over and spent his WWII years in London. Hans's father, Robert, was left behind in Austria and spent the war years with the German Wehrmacht on the Russian Front. After the war, Rudolf moved to New York City and, after getting his US citizenship, sponsored Hans' parents immigration to the US. Hans grew up in the NYC area, attending public and parochial schools and graduated from Fordham Preparatory School in the Bronx in 1965. He attended MIT and received a BS in Physics in 1969. He went to

graduate school at Rutgers University in Physics and received an MS degree in 1971 after getting his draft notice earlier that year. He did a delayed enlistment in the Army in April of that year to

complete his Master's degree requirements and applied for Army OCS.

Hans went to Basic Training at Ft Jackson, SC in July and was notified of acceptance to OCS towards the end of basic training. He attended Infantry OCS at Ft. Benning from October to April of 1972, and was commissioned as a USAR 2nd Lieutenant. Hans went to Signal Officer Basic at Ft Gordon, and graduated 1st in his class. He went on to the Army ADP School at Ft Benjamin Harrison and then went back to Ft. Benning for Airborne School. His last Army School was the

SATCOM Officer's course at Ft. Monmouth before finally being sent to his duty assignment at the US European Command in Stuttgart,

Germany in December of 1972.

Hans was assigned as an ADP plans and operations officer on the general staff at the US European Command HQ. Although primarily supporting intelligence data processing, this work covered diverse technical areas such as full-text message analysis, data base applications, map graphics processing and display, distributed systems implementation, and nuclear targeting and damage assessment models. He was instrumental in providing intelligence updates to the maps in the HQ Command Center during the 1973 Arab-Israeli War and supporting nuclear targeting during NATO command post exercises. Hans also supported information system technical coordination with USEUCOM component commands in London, Ramstein AFB, and Campbell Barracks in Heidelberg, and between SAC, NORAD, and USEUCOM for the SIOP

during his tour of duty. Hans met Audrey, who was the J-5's secretary at USEUCOM, and they were married in 1975. Hans left active service with the Army as a Captain in December

1976.

Upon separation, Hans worked in large scale C2 and intelligence systems development. Hans and Audrey moved to Falls Church, VA and raised a family of three children. Hans went on to be the Chief Engineer and Program Manager on several large intelligence information processing programs for DIA at the Pentagon and NAVINTCOM. In 1989, Hans was named the Program Director for Unisys Defense Systems on the DARPA STARS program (Boeing and IBM were co-contractors), doing pioneering work in domain-specific, architecture-driven, software reuse, process representation and enactment, and software tool integration

frameworks. This collaborative work with contractors, DoD organizations, and the SEI influenced the SEI CMM and the DoD's TAFIM and JTA evolution later in the 1990's.

In late 1995 Hans was named the Director of Engineering and Delivery 1 manager on the Global Transportation Network (GTN) program. In 1998 Hans ran the Joint Logistics Advanced Concept Technology Demonstration (JL-ACTD) Program with DARPA, followed by the Joint Theater Logistics (JTL) ACTD in 2000, both requiring integration across multiple co-contractors and government systems. Also in 2000, Hans was named the Program Manager for the Lockheed Martin Rainbow interoperability initiative, responsible for developing and demonstrating an integrated war fighting scenario among 14 different C4ISR and related systems developed by Lockheed Martin and third-party companies.

In 2004 Hans was selected as a Lockheed Martin Fellow to work in the Advanced Concepts group within Lockheed Martin's Corporate Engineering and Technology organization, where he worked on the F-22 and F-35 programs. Lockheed Martin assigned Hans to represent the company with the newly formed Net Centric Operations Interoperability Consortium (NCOIC) in 2004. In that capacity he was elected Vice Chair of the NCOIC Services and Information Interoperability Working Group in 2005, leading the development and approval of the SCOPE model. Hans was elected and served as the Chair of the NCOIC Network Centric Attributes Functional Team in 2009.

Hans retired from Lockheed Martin in April of 2011, but continued to participate in NCOIC on a volunteer basis to the present day, including giving presentations on interoperability at conferences and workshops and improving training material for SCOPE model practitioners. Hans and Audrey moved to Loris, SC in January 2015 and joined the Grand Strand Chapter in 2018.
