President's Message by Jim Albert



After having to cancel our April and May meetings due to the pandemic, we were able to hold a June luncheon at Kimbels Restaurant on Wachesaw Plantation where we celebrated the award of \$2,000 scholarships to five outstanding area high school Junior ROTC cadets. We were also able to support the Senior ROTC Commissioning pro-

gram at Coastal Carolina University, albeit from a distance, and awarded a \$2,000 Colonel Robert T. Hawkins Leadership Award to a deserving new Second Lieutenant from CCU ROTC.

Despite ongoing pandemic restrictions, the Grand Strand Chapter of MOAA continued to serve local veterans with prepaid food cards, Post Office Box addresses, bus tickets and help with rent and utility payments to keep veterans and their families in their homes. These efforts did not go unnoticed as national MOAA not only awarded us a \$5,000 grant to support local veterans and families in need, but added \$5,000 to our request to help veterans and families impacted by the pandemic (loss of job and/or home, mental health issues, etc.).

If you would like to join our new Veterans Outreach Council and help determine where best to place our support resources, let me know. Or if you would like to donate to these efforts, you may do so by sending a check to our Chapter address in Surfside Beach. For those who have already donated, we thank you very much. 100% of your donations go to needy veterans and families impacted by the pandemic. Finally, if you know of any veteran or family situation that needs our help, let me know and we'll look into it. Besides Chapter support, national MOAA, the VA and others have many new programs to support veterans and families in need.

The seventh annual Myrtle Beach Stand Down will be held on Sept 25, 2020 at the Army Reserve Center in Market Common to provide assistance to homeless and near homeless veterans. In the past, preparations for Stand Down took place one day and the event itself took place the next day. This year's event will be a one day affair with setup from 6-9AM and the veterans arriving from 9AM-4PM. Due to the coronavirus, the event will be handled as a drive thru with tents erected in the parking lot of the Reserve Center. Veterans will remain in their cars and each car will receive materials on how veterans can obtain medical, dental, housing, legal, and other related services. Veterans who do not have automobiles will be escorted by volunteers thru each stop. Upon leaving, each veteran will be provided a box lunch. As usual, Grand Strand MOAA will provide blankets with the MOAA logo to each veteran and cold weather kits to the homeless and destitute veterans. Chapter members are needed as volunteers to act as traffic directors, escorts, and manning our MOAA booth to hand out blankets and cold weather kits. Last year we had 277 veterans process thru and this year we are expecting 300 or more. Our Chapter members have been very generous with their time supporting this important annual event in the past. JROTC PROGRAMS FRONT AND CENTER

This has been a unique spring for all of us in so many ways including our chapter's support for the 17 High School JROTC Units in northeast South Carolina which are in our area of responsibility. As March was opening the units were beginning to submit their nominees for the MOAA JROTC Leadership Medal given annually to a cadet. Chapter members were volunteering to present those medals at the unit awards ceremonies being scheduled from late April to the end of May. Some units were also submitting applications from their most competitive senior cadets for the \$2,000.00 scholarships that the chapter would award at our May dinner meeting.

Suddenly, everything was uncertain.....schools closed, cadets were hard to contact, awards ceremonies were being canceled each week as the virus shut down expanded, our chapter's April meeting and then traditional May JROTC Instructor and Scholarship Awards dinner meeting was also cancelled. Future planning was done via somewhat awkward ZOOM meetings.

Like the professional military officers and planners we once were in our earlier careers, we were undeterred from our mission to support the JROTC Units. Instructors were contacted at home by Dean Brown and Hans Duerr to obtain both medal and scholarship nominees. Dave Townsend rapidly produced the professional grade certificates for our president, Jim Albert, to sign. Awards packages were mailed by Dean to all seventeen schools before the end of the school year for the instructors to distribute to the deserving cadets as each of their school circumstances allowed. Hans gathered up the significant number of applications we received and coordinated the efforts of a board of members to select the five most outstanding cadets. The June Luncheon meeting at Kimbel's Restaurant at Wachesaw Plantation was designated as the JROTC instructor and scholarship Awards recognition event and invitations were sent to all the supported units and to the families of the scholarship selectees.

At noon on 9 June, with all the appropriate COVID-19 precautions in place, Jim Albert opened the lunch meeting where we recognized the fine instructors (and their spouses) who dedicate so much effort to mentoring our youth and our five terrific scholarship awardees. Seven units had instructors in attendance: Aynor Army JROTC's LTC David Roberts, USA (Ret), Georgetown Navy JROTC's CAPT JJ Parker, USN(Ret), Green Sea Floyds Army JROTC's CSM James Sypher, USA (Ret), Loris Army JROTC's LTC Jim McLean USA (Ret), Myrtle Beach Navy JROTC's CDR Dave Kaiser, USN (Ret), North Myrtle Beach Navy JROTC's LCDR Marc Warren, USCG (Ret), and ST James Army JROTC's LTC Scott Bartley, USA (Ret). We were also pleased to honor LTC JD Davis, the Horry County School District JROTC Program Director.

President Jim Albert presented scholarship certificates and lots of photos were taken of our scholarship selectees, their families, and instructors.

MEET THE SCHOLARSHIP WINNERS

Cadet Conisia C. Allen (Navy JROTC) excelled academically with a 3.7 GPA while taking numerous Honors Courses, earning induction into honor societies and the National Beta Club. She served in various leadership positions including Chief of Staff in the Myrtle Beach High School's NJROTC program. Her efforts resulted in the MBHS unit being recognized as the "most improved" program out of over 600 nationwide. Cadet Allen has also given generously of her time mentoring fellow cadets and supporting various



community projects. She will continue her education at Coastal Carolina University.

Cadet Lillian A. Freeman (Navy JROTC) was a 4.0 GPA honor roll student at North Myrtle Beach High School earning academic and leadership awards from numerous national organizations. In her unit



she held the positions of Public Affairs and Executive Officer and initiated several new programs to improve unit operations. She was a member of the unit Academic Team that placed top 90 percentile in the national NJROTC competition. Cadet Freeman also volunteered on campus and in the community fund-raisers for worthy causes. She has received a Letter of Assurance from the US Naval Academy and hopes to be commissioned in the Navy.

Cadet Ethan A. Lewis (Army JROTC) is a scholar, athlete, and leader at Loris High School making the

honor roll, playing on the Loris High School Football Team and in the school orchestra. His Senior Army Instructor describes him as a cadet that epitomizes Army values and always sets the example for peers and subordinates alike. He takes time to mentor junior cadets while holding down a part-time job. His "can-do" attitude and willingness to take on new challenges will undoubtedly serve him well when he attends The Citadel this Fall.



Cadet Alston M. Nash (Navy JROTC) has gathered multiple academic honors as a student and cadet at Georgetown High School. She served as NJROTC Battalion Executive Officer and knew all 160 cadets



by name. Additionally, she was Commander of the Physical Fitness and Armed Regulation Drill Teams. She led the unit to a ranking of the #1 NJROTC unit in North and South Carolina during school year 2018-2019. As soccer player and Team Captain, Cadet Nash won more soccer matches in a four-year period than any other student/athlete at Georgetown before her. Her future goals are to attend USC and become a dentist.

Cadet Dylan L. Young (Navy JROTC) has excelled as a student and JROTC cadet at North Myrtle Beach High School. His honors include selection to the National and Social Studies Honor Societies, and the

American Legion JROTC Academic Excellence Award. As Drum Major of the NMBHS Marching Band, he trained and led the Band in award-winning Band competitions. Each year he held increasingly more responsible and demanding positions in his unit including rifle team commander. Cadet Young will attend The Citadel and seek an active duty military commission.





Chapter Awards and Grants



MOAA Harris Communications Award. National MOAA awarded their highest 5-star award to the GS MOAA Chapter, for both print and digital communications. This includes the Chapter's efforts to publish a comprehensive newsletter several times a year as well as our written and email communications with Chapter members, press releases, photos, and communications with other organizations each month. It also includes efforts to maintain an easy to navigate and up-to-date website and social media sites. Our Chapter was the only South Carolina Chapter (of ten) to receive a 5-star award in both print and digital categories and continues a streak of Harris Communications Awards that goes back five consecutive years.

MOAA Foundation Community Service Grant. The MOAA Foundation awarded the GSMOAA Chapter a \$5,000 grant to support the needs of homeless, near homeless and distressed veterans and their families across our region. This is the 3rd year in a row we received this prestigious and highly selective grant. Funds are used to support our annual Stand Down with the local VA Veterans Center where approximately 300 needy veterans receive a wide array of clothing, blankets, food, medical and dental exams, legal advice, job counseling, housing information and various other life sustaining items and services. We also use this grant to help distressed veterans and their families find jobs, meet appointments, pay rent and utilities, and provide food and home repairs.

MOAA Foundation COVID-19 Support Grant. In addition to the Community Service Grant, the GS MOAA Chapter was awarded another \$5,000 grant from the MOAA Foundation to support local veterans negatively affected by the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. This includes food cards, job training, housing costs and more. Interestingly, this grant was never advertised or opened to applicants, but was granted to a few MOAA Chapters across the country who have an established track record of going above and beyond service to the local veteran community and who operate in a region heavily affected by the economic shutdown. In addition to this special one-time grant, the MOAA Foundation has started a new grant program for individual veterans affected by the pandemic to apply for assistance up to \$500. The GS MOAA Chapter will assist any veteran with the application, who comes forward looking for this type of assistance.

MOAA Establishes COVID-19 Relief Fund

National MOAA has established a COVID-19 Relief Fund to provide assistance to veterans who have been impacted by the pandemic that has swept the country. This fund is designed to provide immediate support in areas of critical need to those who need it most.

The fund is providing emergency financial relief through local chapters as grants up to \$500 per household for military and veteran families. Those chapters are providing aid and assistance to military and veteran families facing unemployment, who are homeless or facing homelessness, who are dealing with food insecurities, and those who need help paying for clothing, utility bills, transportation costs, and more.
